

c. Using Your Imagination

Before starting to read a book, it's fun to look at the illustration on the cover and imagine what a book is about. Why is the little girl looking at the spider and holding a pig? How old do you think the little girl is? Where do you think she lives?

These types of questions help the book come alive. You may want to ask what will happen next at the end of each chapter. It will be fun to see if you can guess what the author will write and consider what you would have written if you were writing the story.
